SPANISH AB INITIO

SUBJECT OVERVIEW

The Spanish Ab Initio course is a foreign language-learning programme designed to be studied by students who have little or no previous experience of the language. In this programme students will be expected to demonstrate the communicative skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing in everyday situations. Throughout this course students will also learn about the culture of Spanish speaking countries. This has become an important element of the course, and it will help students to develop their command of the language.

The course will help students to develop all the different skills to communicate effectively in Spanish:

- Receptive skills (reading and listening).
- Productive skills (writing and speaking).

To develop the receptive skills, students will be exposed to different authentic sources such as magazines and newspapers articles, video clips and songs. Regarding the productive skills, students will learn to communicate in written Spanish using different formats such as messages, letters, emails and blogs used in everyday life. Trips to local Spanish restaurants and to the theatre to see a play in Spanish can be organized depending on numbers.

PRIOR LEARNING REQUIRED

An interest in and a desire to study Spanish are essential. Students who are willing to spend time studying in advance will have an advantage. We aim to instil a deep interest in the subject, and this can be maintained in courses of further education and beyond. It is recommended that students begin learning vocabulary before the course commences by using websites such as Quizlet and Memrise to familiarize themselves with the spelling and sound of Spanish.

COURSE CONTENT

The Spanish ab initio syllabus is organized into five prescribed themes: identities, experiences, human ingenuity, social organization and sharing the planet. The course syllabus prescribes four topics for each of the five prescribed themes making a total of 20 topics that must be addressed in the language ab initio course.

Only available at standard level (SL).

Throughout this course students will:

- Acquire knowledge of vocabulary and grammar which will be reinforced and extended by understanding the audience, context, purpose, meaning and variation.
- Be exposed to a variety of authentic text types in relation to the prescribed themes and topics, as well as the content contained within the language-specific syllabi.
- Produce a wide variety of oral and written texts for audiences, contexts and purposes associated with academic and personal interest.

ASSESSMENT

Formal internal assessments take place regularly about once every half term and homework is set on a regular basis. Grades are determined by final examinations which take place in May/June at the end of the 2-year course. An end of year exam must be passed for entry to year 2 and a mock exam must be passed for entry into the public exams.
